**Child Nutrition and WIC Reauthorization Act of 2004 (Public Law 108-265)**  
***Pilot Projects (as of August 2004)***

**Fresh Fruits & Vegetables in Schools** (§120) – Provides fresh fruit and vegetable snacks at schools in Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Ohio and an Indian reservation<sup>^</sup> in New Mexico. Expanding to Mississippi, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Washington and Indian reservations<sup>^</sup> in Arizona and South Dakota, with special emphasis in the new states on serving children in low-income areas. Operates in 25 schools per state, except Iowa and Mississippi (50 schools per state) and on Indian reservations (25 schools total across 3 states).

**Elimination of Reduced Price** (§124) – Depending on future Congressional funding, makes it possible for schools in up to five states to offer free school meals to families that are currently eligible for reduced price meals, relieving them of the cost of up to 40 cents per meal.

**Simplified SFSP (“Lugar”)** (§116) – Expands to private non-profit sponsors (the program currently applies only to public sponsors) the successful summer food paperwork reduction program, formerly known as “Lugar pilots,” that have already resulted in thousands more low-income children receiving nutritious meals during the summer in 13 states (Alaska, Arkansas, Idaho, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Nebraska, New Hampshire, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Texas, and Wyoming) and Puerto Rico. Also adds six new states to this expanded SFSP paperwork reduction program: Colorado, Louisiana, Michigan, Mississippi, Oregon, and Ohio.

**SFSP Residential Camps** (§121) – Allows one private nonprofit residential camp in each of two states to obtain Summer Food Service Program area eligibility based upon the economic status of the areas where the children live (rather than where the camp is located) for two years. Camps must serve meals at no charge and serve children from areas in which at least 50 percent are eligible for free or reduced price school meals.

**SFSP Year-Round Services** (§123) – Allows private nonprofit organizations and government agencies (excluding schools) in California to operate the Summer Food Service Program year-round. When school is not in session, they may serve up to two meals a day. When school is in session, they may serve a snack after school, on weekends and during school holidays.

**SFSP Rural Transportation** (§116) – Provides grants for 60 sponsors in five states to implement innovative solutions to rural transportation barriers in the Summer Food Service Program for three years.

**SFSP Rural Eligibility** (§116) – Extends the Summer Food Service Program area eligibility threshold in rural areas of Pennsylvania from 50 to 40 percent for two years.

**CACFP Rural Eligibility** (§119) – Extends the Child and Adult Care Food Program Tier I area eligibility threshold for family child care homes in rural areas of Nebraska from 50 to 40 percent for two years.

**CACFP Nutrition Education** (§119) – Depending on future Congressional funding, provides grants in four states for nutrition education programs to enhance obesity prevention activities by Child and Adult Care Food Program sponsors and child care centers that serve limited-English-proficient families. States must have experienced 100 percent growth in their limited-English-proficient populations between 1990 and 2000.

**CACFP Suppers<sup>\*\*\*</sup>** – Allows afterschool programs in Delaware, Illinois, Michigan, Missouri, New York, Oregon, and Pennsylvania to serve suppers as well as snacks. Programs must be located in areas where 50 percent or more of the children qualify for free or reduced price school meals.

**WIC Fruits & Vegetables** (§203) – Depending on future Congressional funding, provides grants to up to 10 local WIC sites to evaluate the feasibility of including fresh, frozen or canned fruits and vegetables as an addition to food items included in regular WIC food packages. Fruits and vegetables would be made available through private funds.
