⁴ According to the School Nutrition Association, the national average price for a school breakfast is \$1.46 for elementary schools, \$1.53 for middle schools, and \$1.55 for high schools.

⁵ These reimbursement rates do not include the value of commodities (or cash in lieu of commodities), \$0.2450 for the period 7/1/20 through 6/30/21, which institutions receive as additional assistance for each lunch or supper served. *Federal Register*, Vol. 85, No. 141, 7/22/20, pp. 44273. ⁶ Applies to schools where 60 percent or more lunches served during the second preceding school year were free or reduced price.

⁷ The 7 cents is available to schools that are certified to meet the updated meal pattern requirements beginning on October 1, 2012. This is the first year the Performance-based Reimbursement based on inflation has increased since it was created in 2012.

⁸ According to the School Nutrition Association, the national average price for a school lunch is \$2.48 for elementary schools, \$2.68 for middle schools, and \$2.74 for high schools.
