The WIC Program: Improving Maternal and Child Health and Fighting Hunger

The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) provides pregnant, postpartum, and breastfeeding individuals, infants, and children up to 5 years of age from households with low incomes with nutritious foods, nutrition education and counseling, breastfeeding support, and referrals to health care and social services.

WIC's Reach

WIC provided essential nutrition and health support to 1,512,339 women; 1,486,961 infants; and **3,705,029** children.⁷

FEDERAL DOLLARS SENT TO COMMUNITIES **THROUGH WIC IN FISCAL YEAR 2024**

WIC spent \$4.911.410.861 at food retailers: provided **\$1,644,702,625** in formula rebates; and provided \$2,263,793,275 in nutrition education, breastfeeding, and administration funding.8
